

SKELETONS OF NINE INDIANS.

**They Were Dug Up at Sag Bridge, Ill.
—The People See Ghosts.**

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.—The inhabitants of Sag Bridge on the Drainage Canal are greatly exercised over the discovery of the bones of nine Indians, which were thrown up by the excavators last Sunday. Scientists from Chicago examined the bones yesterday. Prof. Dosey pronounced them the bones of Indians, dead several hundred years ago. One of the skeletons was that of a man over seven feet high.

Nine years ago other skeletons were dug up on the same ground, but were reburied because some of the people of the neighborhood said the spirits of the Indians haunted the place and demanded that their bones be reinterred. According to the stories told, phantom Indians on horseback roamed through the village at night and frightened men and women.

These same ghosts are at it again, so the Sag Bridgers say, and the effect has been to make some of the women almost ill. Several of the skeletons have been buried again; the others were taken to the Field Museum, and it is the spirits of these which the people say are making trouble.

The Kelly brothers, who dug up the skeletons, say their house is haunted, and that they will have to move out.
